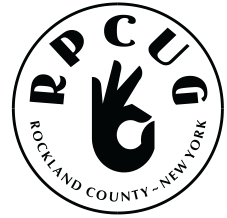

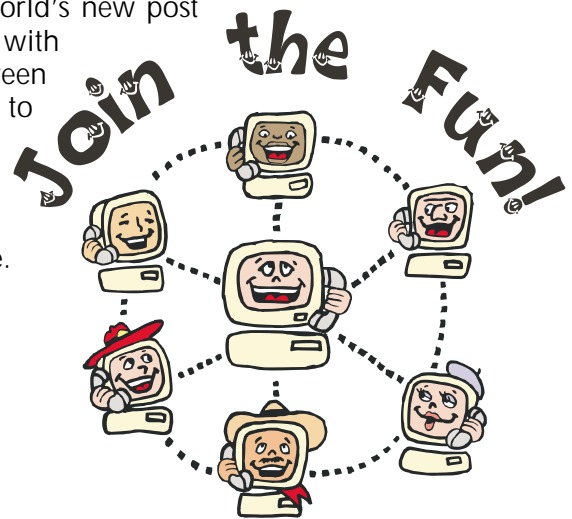



YOU TOO can REVIEW!

Reviewing for the newsletter is fun! You get to keep the software, CD's, and books that you review, but it is a job that requires promptness and some command of the written English language. You should be able to check out the product and review it within about a month or less. The vendors need to get feedback as soon as possible. They can be very generous if we can fulfill this requirement



If you are interested, find a piece of software or book that you already have and write about 200 words on the subject.

Keep your writing personal. Your own hands-on experience and observations are what is needed. It is helpful to make notes of observed goodies or glitches as you begin to explore the review item. Keep in mind the kinds of things YOU would like to know if you were reading a review of the product. Do not simply list the features of the program or tell prospective users how to use it—tell how YOU used it, how it helped, failed, facilitated, hindered, etc. Look up past issues of **ComputerConnection**, find a review that you enjoyed reading, and use it as a model.

The network is down.

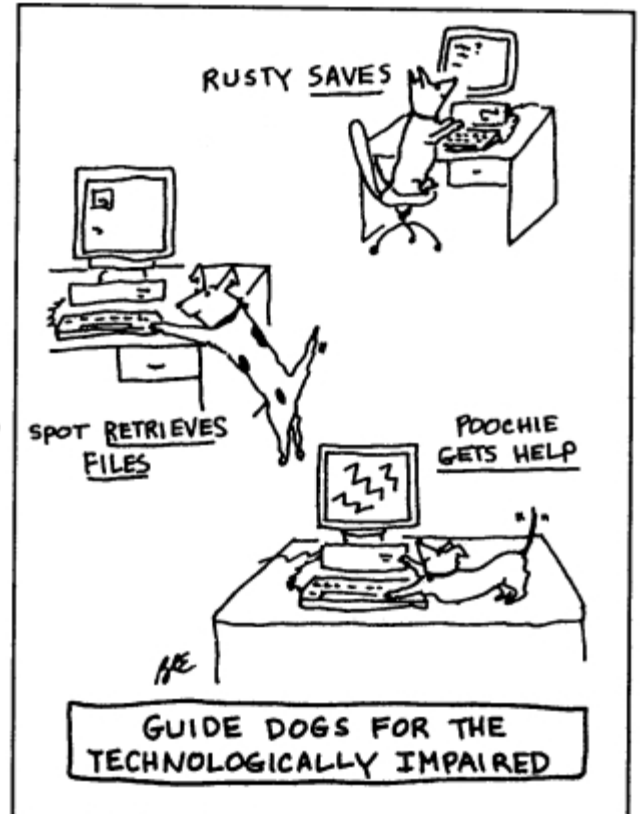
A crash reduces

In the News...

New York, NJ, Dec. 8 — People for the Ethical Treatment of Software (PETS) announced today that seven more software companies have been added to the group's "watch list" of companies that regularly practice software testing.

"There is no need for software to be mistreated in this way so that companies like these can market new products," said Ken Granola, spokesperson for PETS. "Alternative methods of testing these products are available."

According to PETS, these companies force software to undergo lengthy and arduous tests, often without rest for hours or days at a time. Employees are assigned to "break" the software by any means necessary, and inside sources report that they often joke about "torturing" the software.

"It's no joke," said Granola. "Innocent programs, from the day they are compiled, are cooped up in tiny rooms and 'crashed' for hours on end. They spend their whole lives on dirty, ill-maintained computers, and are unceremoniously deleted when they're not needed anymore."

Granola said the software is kept in unsanitary conditions and is infested with bugs. "We know alternatives to this horror exist," he said, citing industry giant Microsoft Corp. as a company that has become extremely successful without resorting to software testing.

Hang2000, version 1.3

Hang2000 is the electronic version of the old fashioned *Hangman* game. Remember the one we use to draw on a chalk board? When choosing letters you can use the mouse or keyboard. There are many categories built into **Hang2000**, or you can enter your own words or even phrases.

When I heard about **Hang2000**, I thought to myself: *do I really want to download this and go through the trouble of installing and learning a new game?* Well, I agreed to review **Hang2000** and boy, was I pleasantly surprised! I went to the Winograd web site, e-mailed Ken and within 24 hours, I had the registration number.

Downloading was quick and problem-free. The registration number worked, and before I knew it **Hang2000** was up on my screen.

My eleven-year-old nephew was helping me test-drive **Hang2000**. I said to him, "Let's read the 'read me' file first."

"Why?" was his reply, "just click on the 'words' category." Before I could stop him, he was clicking away. He choose the category, "authors." The screen filled with dash lines and he was off playing and choosing letters. Could it be this easy, I wondered? Doesn't it come with a three-pound manual? No, it doesn't come with a manual and yes, it is user-friendly.

There are many interesting categories from which to choose. A big plus is the additional information given with the answer. For example, Rudyard Kipling was the answer in the "authors" category my nephew chose, and on the bottom of the screen he received much more information about Kipling.

There are many fun categories, such as Star Trek, Rock and Roll, Television Shows, etc.

My nephew loved the graphics and sound effects. Each time he chose a wrong letter, a piece of an image appeared on the screen, building a desert scene complete with a stage coach, cactus mountains and a hangman area. The graphics are non-violent and my nephew gave them a rating of "coool!" He enjoyed the sound effects even more, and for days remained glued to the computer playing and learning at the same time. He got to choose the number of guesses for each game with 12 being the maximum. When he chose 12, he could hear a chicken clucking.

One great feature is that you can program your child's spelling list into **Hang2000**. But you can do so much more with this feature. My husband likes the

American Indian culture. My nephew and I set out on a research expedition. Reading books and catalogs, we designed a custom word list for my husband. Then the fun began as we watched my husband choose each letter carefully. Every time he choose a wrong letter the sound effects sent us roaring with laughter!

This isn't a game only for children, but for us all. A report recently stated that if we use our brains in the problem solving mode, it keeps us younger. They are now discovering that the brain does regenerate new cells - but only by using it. **Hang2000** is perfect for keeping families learning and growing together.

CUDDLY PC VIRUS TURNS CHILDREN INTO WEB VICTIMS

LONDON, Aug 24 (Reuters) - Children everywhere beware — Pikachu is not as cuddly as he seems.



The Japanese Pokemon cartoon character has mutated on the Web into a nasty little computer-bugger, spreading himself via emails like the devastating "Love Bug" did.

Virus experts said on Thursday the cute yellow rabbit-like creature, a darling of the Pokemon video-game family, had popped up in the United States, wrecking PCs that it gets into by wiping out their system files.

"Pokey" has so far sown only a fraction of the havoc its famous predecessor did, but for a worrying reason. Kids, not corporations, are this time the target of the cyber-vandals.

"We haven't seen viruses or worms targeted at children before... This is the first one. Since it comes as a

little Pokemon animation, 10-year-olds are likely to be more interested in double-clicking on it."

Viruses infect a computer and cause damage, but rely on users unwittingly spreading them from one PC to another. Worms, usually using the Internet, find their own way to spread.

This worm appears as an email with the title "Pikachu Pokemon" and the English message "Pikachu is your friend."

Japanese anti-virus firm Trend Micro advises anyone receiving the mail to delete the file without opening it. The Love Bug and the earlier Melissa viruses attracted so much attention that many computer users now know they should treat unsolicited email attachments with suspicion, experts say — but that is unlikely to include young children.

USPS MULLING EMAIL OPTION FOR RESIDENTS

As part of its ongoing attempt to revamp itself for the digital world, the U.S. Postal Service today said it is considering offering all U.S. residents a service that would route their physical mail to an email account.


The USPS, which maintains a database of some 120 million residential addresses, said no specific timeline was given for when the new service—still in early stages of research and development—would be available.

“What’s in the works is seeing if we can (offer) the possibility of linking physical and electronic addresses,” said Sue Brennan, a USPS spokeswoman. “This (new service) is about giving a customer a choice on how they want to do business with us.” For example, she said, a customer can request that some items, such as catalogs or utility bills, be sent via email instead of by the traditional mail service. In a secure environment, similar to that of First Class mail, utility bills and other items could be sent to an email address rather than a home mailbox, she added.

The USPS also said it is mulling ways to provide a forwarding email service for customers who switch

their email accounts to a new Internet service provider (ISP).

In recent years, the USPS has taken steps to keep up with emerging technologies as the Internet gives traditional mail service added competition. Among its efforts to stay with the rapidly changing and competitive landscape, the USPS has licensed Internet postage services to companies such as E-Stamp and Stamps.com, as well as entered other new areas such as electronic bill payment.

Earlier this year, the postal service linked with CheckFree to allow customers to pay bills electronically. CheckFree is providing electronic billing and payment services to the post office’s Web site, allowing customers who sign up to pay their bills online to a small number of large companies, including long-distance carriers, regional utility companies and wireless companies.
