



My Favorite Computer Newsletters

Over the years we all find some things to be better or maybe different from others. I have a few newsletters and services that fall into that category and that I find interesting, informative and useful. I have been reading them for some years, some daily and some weekly. All are free.

The best of these is **Lockergnome Windows Daily**. It is informative, discusses many different subjects – all related to computers – and reviews different software: freeware, shareware and commercial. Written in a light, breezy manner, there is almost always at least one item that I'll download or investigate further. Obviously, by its name, a daily, I look forward to seeing it in my Inbox every day. Each review supplies a links to the author's website. The last issue I received covered items such as:

✓ **GrafixCat v1.0 [271k] W9x/2k/XP FREE**

GrafixCat is a specialized search tool used to search your computer for specified image files (bitmaps, JPEGs, PNGs, GIFs, Metafiles, PCX and icons). The search results can be filtered, searched, and saved as catalogs, and you can also perform some basic image management functions like copy, delete, rename, and more. GrafixCat includes a built-in image viewer to preview and full-screen view any images.



The second newsletter is a weekly by Brian Livingstone: **Window Manager**. Brian discusses items relating to Windows, usually covering one topic. Some are more than you want to know about subjects but if you like to keep informed about new things happening in Windows this is a good place to go. Always readable and interesting. The lead paragraph (shown below) of his latest newsletter discusses some questionable Microsoft activities that are not generally known.

I reported three weeks ago that the WU (Windows Update) routine had been changed by Microsoft so that it now uploads your Product ID number and a list of your installed hardware (see "What Windows knows"). To subscribe:

I download something almost every day and try it out. As anyone who has used shareware over the years finds some of these programs are amazing. There always seem to be one or two that are digital photo handlers or albums, some better than the commercial stuff I've seen. Both offer new software and updates of previously reported on software. Both also give you direct links to read a little more about the program and to download it.

The first one is *VersionTracker*. I've shown a complete listing of one day's information. I think it covers the gamut of most people's interests.

WINDOWS EXPLORER TIP

When you click **Start | My Documents**, Windows Explorer opens in the *My Documents* folder. When you click **Start | My Computer**, Windows Explorer opens in *My Computer*. But what if you commonly want to start Windows Explorer someplace else? What if you frequently want to open Windows Explorer in, say, the Program Files folder? It's easy, if you know the trick.

1. Right-click any blank part of the Desktop
2. Click **New | Shortcut**
3. In the box that says *Type the Location of the Item*, type in a line like this:
`explorer /e,/root,"c:\program files"`. You have to be very careful and type that line precisely the way I showed it. In particular, there's a space before the first slash, but no spaces afterwards (except inside the quote marks).
4. Click **Next**
5. In the box that says *Type a name for this shortcut*, type a reasonable name, such as **Program Files**.
6. Then click **Finish**.

Windows will put a shortcut on your Desktop that launches Windows Explorer at the location you specified. Double-click on it, and you'll see how it works. ☺ —Thanks to Steve Weinberg

SpeedUpMyPC

reviewed by Steve Weinberg

SpeedUpMyPC is one of those aftermarket utilities reminiscent of the years when the basic PC operating system was delivered with few and feeble control programs. Today's operating systems are so much more complex, but here's a utility that can be used to tune up several critical areas and make your system run faster and more reliably. It frees up unused memory, speeds up boot time, assigns priorities to different programs you run and speeds your connection to the Internet.


Startup: What I found to be most useful was a list of tasks running in the background when I start my PC. Many product installations, even when uninstalled, leave remnants in your system that are running in the background and serve to slow down your system. SpeedUpMyPC presents a list of these and allows you to turn off any that you choose. Checking the box once more allows them to be turned on, should you find that you were overzealous in reducing your PC's work load.

The installation was quick and easy; all that was required was to run the setup.exe on the CD as there are no install instructions. On my Windows 2000 system, I installed as the 'administrator' user. I use several logins to my




system, one for each family member. This keeps them out of trouble as it prohibits the casual user from running certain programs or accessing certain files and tunes each environment to the appearance they prefer. As has happened before, this does not mesh well with running this program in one of the user environments.

When started, the program suggests some areas that can be improved. Click each link and you can perform each of the suggested tasks. Here are examples of some of the improvements I made.



Memory (RAM Utilization Optimization): Nice graphs of usage are presented. Buttons below allowed me to do a quick recovery, which netted me an extra 6 megabytes and a 'Deep Recovery,' which netted me a whopping 112 megabytes and 62 megabytes at two different times.

Internet connection: This option allowed me to check my connection speed and, with a single button push, optimize settings for my connection. It works with dial-up or broadband connections. It does require a restart of the PC. The second button is used to optimize browser settings. It was not clear whether it optimized settings for all three browser that I have on my system or not.



I could not tell whether the browser settings helped me, either. However, when I checked my speed at DSLREPORTS.COM, it should show a miraculous improvement.

The 674 kbps value is much more than the purchased speed of 384 kbps. I got successive readings more in line with the 384 level, but it certainly didn't hurt to tweak the settings. Check out your own speed at [and](#) click on the 'Our Tools' link. Go to 'Speed Test' and give it a try.

Recovery From Crashes: One of the most important features of this program is the ability to recover from crashes. I could not test this aspect for obvious reasons. It is claimed that it is able to prevent, and recover from crashes a number of ways. SpeedUpMyPC will first try

and terminate suspicious tasks that can be suspected of causing or about to cause a crash. Additionally, the Windows shell may lose functionality in which case SpeedUpMyPC will restart the shell.

You have the option of setting hot keys to force the program to terminate suspicious tasks, and free up CPU and RAM resources. Once installed, a small icon shows up on your System Tray and shows current statistics when you hover over it.

It seems worth the \$29.95 and requires only a minimum 16 megabytes of RAM on a 400 Megahertz system running Windows 98, Windows 2000 or Windows XP.

Michigan Senate Passes Law Creating Do-Not-E-mail List

"Michigan's state Senate unanimously passed an anti-spam law on Tuesday that calls for the creation of a do-not-e-mail list.

The law still needs to be passed by the state's house of representatives and signed into law by the governor.

Under the terms of the bill, passed 37 to zero, the state's consumer and industry services division would contract with a company to maintain a do-not-e-mail list. Michigan residents fed up with the flood of spam in their in-boxes would then be able to register their e-mail addresses on the list for \$5 each. Businesses would pay a \$150 blanket fee to cover all their employees. Registration would last three years."



WINDOWS XP KILLER TIPS

When I first started with computers, I was taught by a young man that worked with my wife. He would come over to the house and sit with me for hours as I tried to understand what he was showing me... what patience! We would install a new program and he would click away like he had been using it for years. Operating a computer came naturally to him. I would ask him how he knew what to do without reading the manual, he just knew. The problem was: it didn't for me. Personally, I never looked forward to reading manuals or "How to Books", they were always very technical and boring.

To my surprise, that was not the case with **Windows XP Killer Tips**. The author must have been tired of the other kind, as this really isn't a manual, but more a series of useful tips. The humor that he has interjected into the book made it an enjoyable read.

If you are an experienced Windows user many of the tips you may know and already use. I am sure that there will be many that you were unaware of or have forgotten because of lack of use. With this in mind, by reading the book you will be able to refresh your memory and add some new tips to your arsenal.

The book is written in a very friendly way. With every tip that is given, there is a photo that shows exactly what he is talking about. There is no guessing as to what to click on or where to find something.

One of the things that I found useful was the way the Table of Contents was setup. You can locate tips that you may need quickly. You will be able to make XP look the way you want it to. You can change the annoying pop-up windows that XP seem to have built-in, find tips on e-mailing and movie making. If you are daring you can even try out some of the "Registry Hacks".

There is even a chapter devoted to the most annoying things that XP does.

- ✓ "Do you want to send an error report?"
...**No!**
- ✓ "Do you really want to delete that file?"...**Yes!**

✓ A pop-up tells you that you have installed a new program...**No Kidding!**

(I know that they are trying to help, but these types of pop-ups drive me crazy.)

One tip that I found very interesting was a hidden application that XP has, but doesn't advertise - "Winchat." If you are using a home network and you want to communicate with others on the system, bring up Winchat, choose who you want to contact and start typing. Winchat must be running on both computers to be able to communicate, but it is better than hollering through the house. From your *Start Menu*, go to *Run* then type in "Winchat" and click OK. You must do this on any computer that you want to talk with. You can also put the program in the Startup folder so that it starts when you boot-up.

You can also learn how to associate a file type to more than one application. When you open the file, XP will give you a choice of what program you would like to use to work with it. I find this is very useful when working with graphic files.

I would recommend that you look into **Windows XP Killer Tips**. You will be pleasantly surprised with the ease of use as well as the information provided.
